There will be a \$5 entry fee that can be paid that morning from 7 to 8:20. Proceeds will go to the Roxbury park improvement fund. The top overall male and female finishers will each receive a \$10 gift certificate to an area running store.

The race is named after the founder and initial head director of the road race series.
